

#### Can SB 442 Be Saved?

If you're confused about how the fight over SB 442, the popular marijuana funding bill, ended, you're not alone. Governor Gianforte's 11:59th-hour veto left officials and the public uncertain if his use of questionable tactics to block the Legislature's right to vote to override his veto would succeed.

Thank you to all of you who called, wrote, and signed petitions telling the Governor to support SB 442 and to let the Legislature vote on the veto override. At this current impasse, it's helpful to take a look into how we ended up here and what it says about how to go forward.

Public land funding from recreational marijuana revenue was under serious threat from many quarters from the start of the session. Senator Mike Lang's amended SB 442 emerged as a smart solution. The bill kept money in the existing public lands and habitat programs while also improving habitat enhancement through the revisioned Wildlife Habitat Improvement Program. This would have provided approximately \$28M annually for public land and access expansion, wildlife habitat improvement on public and private lands, studying nongame wildlife, improvements of state parks and trails, veterans programs, county roads maintenance, and the HEART fund (addiction services). It was the "win-win" everyone looks for.



When SB 442 finally found its way to Governor Gianforte's desk, he chose to ignore thousands of Montanans by vetoing the bill. This surprising move occurred the same day that the Senate adjourned, casting the future of the bill in doubt. While we don't know if the rules will allow a legislative veto override as only one body of the legislature had finished, we do know that we couldn't have gotten to this point without the immense support from all of you, our conservation partners, and the broad coalition of groups this bill brought to the table.

This process highlights how much can be accomplished with collaboration and bipartisanship and reinforced the idea that all Montanans want elected officials who care about clean air, clean water, public lands, and fish and wildlife. No matter the fate of SB 442, it was a win for conservation and common sense, and it shows us the way forward for future attacks on this funding, public lands, and our democracy.

## **HB 971: A Loss for Climate and Public Health** This week Montana Conservation Voters released the following statement from Executive

Director Whitney Tawney in response to Montana's Governor Greg Gianforte signing into law House Bill 971, a bill to limit the state Department of Environmental Quality's ability to assess the greenhouse gas emissions impacts of power plants and coal mines:

"Montanans know the climate crisis is real. We see it in our forests, on our farms and ranches and in our rivers every year. Governor Gianforte's plan to ignore the problem and strip the state's ability to consider climate in its decision making is irresponsible and will impact our kids and our health. The Governor's actions also weaken the Montana Environmental Policy Act, a foundational law that has kept Montana the Last Best Place for generations."

During the 68th session of the Montana Legislature, HB 971 faced vocal opposition from the public, drawing over 1,000 comments, 95-percent of which were opposed to the measure.


